American Samoa

Togiola T.A. Tulafono was sworn in as American Samou's Governor on Monday, April 7, 2003 after American Samou's Governor Tauese Sunia sudden death on Wednesday, March 26, 2003.

Prior to assuming the Governorship, Togiola Tulafono served as Lieutenant Governor of American Samoa from 1997. He was born

February 28, 1947 and was educated at Samoana High School, Chadron State College in Nebraska, Washburn University School of Law in Topeka, Kansus and National Judicial College in Reno, Nevada. A lawyer with approximately 20 years in private practice,

Governor Tulafono has been a policeman, administrative assistant for the Secretary of Samoan Affairs, Samoan Assistant to the Attorney General; District Court Judge; Senator for Saole County for 4 years; Senator for Sua County for 8 years; first chairman of the Board of Directors for the American Samoa Power Authority; and first chairman of the Board of High Education.

Governor Tulafono had also served as

chairman for the American Samoa Centennial Committee during the 2000 celebration marking 100 years since American Samoa became a US possession and as chairman of the South Pacific Mini

Games Committee in 1997 when the territory hosted the regional games. He has been a deacon for more than 24 years at the Congregational Christian

Church in American Samoa (CCCAS) Sailele.

Governor Tulafono has always been supportive of Pacific Islander community events on the mainland, and NPIEN is honored to have him participate as keynote speaker in the 2003 conference.

In a recent speech in Carson,
California, he spoke of the importance of
recognizing that we represent all
Samoans, and must never forget that
"even though we may not know those back
home, they know us."

These words emphasize NPIEN's mission to further networking opportunities both here on the mainland and back home on the islands. •

Congressman Robert A. Underwood was elected to his first term in November 1992 to represent Guam in the U.S. House of Representatives, and served until 2002. The Guam message is basically a story

about a people who struggle for recognition, people who are looking for political empowerment, people who are looking to contribute to the American body politic. Guam has a proud history.

How to convey that is the continuing dilemma of any elected official who has to contend with the multifaceted and complex world of Washington. Congressman Underwood has attempted to do that by telling the Guam story.

Prior to his election to Congress, Underwood was the Academic Vice President at the University of Guam. The Congressman began his career as a teacher at the George Washington High School and later joined the faculty at the University of Guam in 1976. A career educator, Congressman Underwood holds Bachelor's and Master's degrees in History from California State University and a Doctor of Education degree in Policy Planning from the University of Southern California.

As Guam's voice in Washington,

Congressman Underwood fought for the rights of all the people of the Territory. He is committed to promoting and preserving the Chamorro culture, expanding educational opportunities for our children and

improving the lives of our families. Under the guidance of Delegate Underwood,

Guam's congressional offices work in close coop-

eration with island leaders. Through regular contact with all island residents, the constituents' desires are effectively represented.

Congressman Robert A. Underwood was born in Tamuning, Guam on July 13, 1948 to Esther Flores Taitano and John Martinez. Underwood and was raised in Sinajana, Guam. He is married to Lorraine Aguilar Underwood, and they have five children: Sophia Rosario; Roberto Anacletus; Ricardo Hurao; Ramon John Joseph; and Raphael Vicente.

Congressman Underwood organized the first Summit on Southeast Asians and Pacific Islanders in Washington D.C. in 2001. It was shortly after the summit that NPIEN was organized, thanks to the encouragement and inspiration of Congressman Underwood. *
